Uncertainty and Connecting

Dear Children of God at ALC,

The account of the Easter story from the gospel of Mark has been lingering in my mind the past few weeks. The women came to the tomb that first Easter morning seeking Jesus. They anticipated finding Jesus' lifeless body. Their relationship with him and wanting to care for him (even in his death) drove them to seek Jesus. The women came to the tomb filled with grief for the past. They came worried about the present and completely uncertain about the future.

Instead of encountering death, the women were sent back to the disciples and back to Galilee, the place where they first experienced Jesus' fullness and life. The women didn't know what to do. Nothing made sense to them. And Mark's gospel tells us that the women didn't say anything to anyone because they were afraid.

Two thousand years later we aren't that different from the women who came seeking Jesus.

We continue to seek Jesus. You come to worship and are part of this community of faith because you want to see Jesus. You want to experience God's love and grace and freedom that are possible in and through Jesus. We also come with grief for the past-whether personal loss or the loss of what the church once was. We come with worry about our present lives and the world around us. And we come with uncertainty and fear about the future- both our personal future and the future of the church.

As we seek Jesus, we experience Jesus' fullness and abundant life. But we, like the women, as the body of Christ in this place and time sometimes don't know what to do. Often nothing makes sense and life is confusing and messy. We don't know how to or are afraid to share with others about the transformation and new life that Jesus gives us.

In recent conversations, I've heard people in the community around us longing for connection- connection with other people and connection with God or something bigger than themselves. There is something innate in each human being that longs for spiritual connection. God created each of us to be spiritual beings. All human beings need a spiritual connection in order to be well, to thrive.

We have the women who first discovered that Jesus was alive to thank for spreading that good news. The women had to wrestle with figuring out how to share about the abundant life they experienced through Jesus. They eventually figured out how to share, despite the fear they felt. I wonder what story will be told 2000 years from now about the people in Livingston who overcame uncertainty and fear to share Jesus' love with the community longing for spiritual connection? I think it's going to be a really good story!!

I Am Still with You

The final month of the school year is upon us. For some of our students it's the final month of their college careers. This time of year, is filled with project deadlines, looming exams, monstrous papers, and all the late nights, high anxiety, and fuzzy brains that come along with the course load. The majority of our students are in survival mode, and as far as campus ministry is concerned, we are doing what we can to help these busy humans reach the finish line.

There is a line in Psalm 139 that gives me pause every time I come across it. In some translations the second half of verse 18 reads, "I come to the end -- I am still with you." The psalmist is trying to count Gods thoughts, to understand Gods ways, and in doing so reaches his limits. The way I read it, the psalmist comes "to the end" of his probing reflection and exhausted declares, "I am still with you." It seems that understanding God, at least for him, ultimately takes a backseat to being with God.

Our students are coming to the end of a semester, a grad degree, a college career. They will cram their heads full of as much knowledge as possible until their final, final is complete. Like the psalmist, they will stretch their brains to the limit. And when the end comes, I hope they, like the psalmist, are struck with the realization that whatever the outcome, God is still with them, and they are still with God.

That we are with God and God is with us is an easy message to

share, but a hard one to realize. It's one thing to know a subject or to master a discipline. It's another thing to know and fully embrace Gods presence. Yet that is what this Easter season is all about, knowing and trusting Gods living presence in the here and now, even and maybe especially, when we've reached our limits.
