Dear Children of God at ALC,

A couple of weeks ago I gathered via Zoom with the other members of the Montana Synod Hunger Team. Our task was to evaluate the applications we had received for grants from the Synod Hunger Fund. We ended up awarding a total of \$12,000 to seven different ministries from across the Synod! These grants went to:

- Lutheran Church of Sunburst for Thanksgiving baskets
- Our Redeemer's, New Life, and Saint John's Evangelical Lutheran in Helena to provide for their campaign to raise the funds needed to provide milk for the weekend food pack for students in Helena and several surrounding communities
- Bethany Lutheran in Dutton to provide food baskets to families
- Our Saviors in Laurel for their holiday food drive
- Family Promise in Missoula to provide monthly community meals
- Peace Lutheran in Billings for their food pantry
- Atonement Lutheran in Billings for their work of supporting teen food pantries in area middle schools

What a wonderful thing to be able to give this financial support to ministries that are doing incredible work to feed their hungry neighbors! These sorts of hunger ministries are becoming more and more important for families who are struggling to put food on their tables. I'm really grateful that these ministries exist to care for our neighbors.

A couple of Sundays ago, I got to worship with one of the churches that received a grant, Atonement Lutheran in Billings.

Their pastor shared with great joy that they had received \$3,000 from the Synod Hunger Fund to support the work they are doing to help food pantries in three area middle schools. They were so excited to be able to have these funds that would allow them to grow and deepen this ministry.

None of this would be possible without the support of our congregation and other congregations and individuals across the Montana Synod who have helped to raise money for the Synod Hunger fund! THANK YOU!!! Special thank you to all of you who donated to our July benevolence to support the Synod Hunger Fund, those who donated to sponsor individual bike riders, all the people who biked the Dough For Daily Bread ride in July, those who supported those who biked, all the picnic attenders who helped the bike riders celebrate their ride, Karla who helped with much of the organizing, and Dale who led the BBQing.

Thanks to your participation and generosity, more of our neighbors across the synod won't have to worry about where their next meal is coming from. This is a beautiful example of how the work of the broader Church allows us to do so much more together than any one church could do on its own. Together as a Church \$41,768 has been given towards working to end hunger in communities across the Synod! While I continue to pray that hunger would end, in the meantime I'm grateful that together we can demonstrate God's love in this way. Peace,

I attended Sunday school at ALC, (believe me, sitting on FREEZING metal chairs in the Sunday school rooms was no small achievement!) I was confirmed at ALC. With wonderful church leaders and chaperones, several high school classmates worked for a year and a half to earn enough money to travel together and attend the Lutheran Youth Convention in New

Orleans. I attended marriages and funerals sitting in the same pews, and it was ALC that gave me the courage, insight, and deep personal growth and tremendous staff and role models that encouraged me to be both camper and staff member at Christikon for three summers. It was ALC, its pastors and other church leaders, who helped me hold on to the courage to both attend and ultimately graduate from Concordia, a college dedicated to the Christian life. With much thoughtful prayer and wonderful faith and friendships, I became an EGLESH TEECHURE in Wilton, ND. I worshipped at a Lutheran country church in Wilton, and while spending the first eleven wonderful years at what would end up being my life's work...I found a need to come home. And so it was that led to twenty-three amazing years of teaching EENGLISH at PARC HI. Every day I was able to embrace students, family, friends and mountains. All of this was done with deep loving, and learning, and being held tightly with care beyond my knowing, by members of ALC. So now I try to write an article that offers and acknowledges a continued gift from this church. In my retirement, I have again found strength, help, love and support beyond my knowing. With this gift, I pray we all might find time to praise and greet, pray and sing, laugh and commune, AND MORE...as a church family together at ALC. And as I, and so many of you, find time and opportunity to look, both back and ahead, to give and receive love for all we have come to know as our church family...may we always pray and accept ways to be made whole and understand, dear Lord, as "thy love is beyond our knowing."


Shout out to...

A Table in the Wilderness

In Psalm 78:19 the people of Israel, while wandering in the desert and wondering if God will take care of them, ask, "Can God spread a table in the wilderness?"



The college and young adult years often resemble the wilderness wanderings of the Israelites. Students are trying to figure out who they are, who their people are, what their purpose is, and who God is, among other things. It's a time when the faith of their youth is tested, when they are stretched in a way they have not been before, when they genuinely wonder whether or not this God they have heard about their whole lives will show up when needed most.

In the midst of this wilderness period our campus ministry "spreads a table." This table is the manifestation of grace in the wilderness. It is a place to be fed. It is a space to belong. It is a moment to remember that God does indeed show up.

"Can God spread a table in the wilderness?" Absolutely. No question. I witness it over and over again.

What I marvel at even more is how God does this. God spreads this table through the generous hearts and capable hands of our volunteer cooks each Wednesday. God spreads this table through the students who extend invitations to classmates and serve food to those in need in our community. God spreads this table through our extended Table & Grace family who, through their ongoing generosity, provide resources that make this ministry possible.

Thank you for your part in helping us spread the table as we feed students' stomachs and souls week after week. It is an honor and privilege to partner with you and participate in God's work in this way.
